Portrait of kindness

Calvary Tabernacle Church in Delray Beach may not be the only faith-based ministry to work with the homeless, but it may be the first to have a

portrait of Christ auctioned on eBay to help

support it.

A cousin of Francesco
Alessandro Anciani, an
Italian artist, donated the
painting to Christ Found
All Creation Saved Inc.
ministries to help raise
money. The portrait can
be seen on the ministries'
Web site at cfacs.com.

The portrait, done in acrylics, measures 47 by 39 inches and hangs in the office of the Rev. Charles Tolbert, who runs the ministries on McNab Road in Fort Lauderdale. The ministry supports community outreach endeavors of other churches, including Calvary Tabernacle.

Initially offered for sale on eBay in December, the minimum asking bid for the painting is \$5,000. No one had made an offer by press time. Tolbert, who plans to renew the listing, said he's had about 100 hits to the Web site and an insurance company in Coral Springs expressed serious interest.

"Many people were interested in helping the homeless. If we get 1,000 people doing something on their own in the form of donations that's good too even if we don't sell the painting," Tolbert said. "I'm going to leave it on indefinitely, and believe there is a party who will understand the importance of the painting and what the funds will be used for."

Through Tolbert's ministry to an 86-year-old Russian woman with no

family in Florida, he met **Giana Sperri**, a cousin of the artist. When Sperri heard of Tolbert's outreach to the homeless, Sperri donated the painting to help raise money for the ministry.

Israel Rosado is the pastor of Calvary
Tabernacle of Delray Beach, an outreach
fellowship of Calvary Chapel of Boca Raton.
Rosado started the outreach to the homeless in
Veterans Park in Delray Beach almost two years
ago. The church conducts services at Temple
Emeth, west of Delray Beach.

"That was one of the reasons why the church was formed. We would go fishing where other

churches think there are no more fish," Rosado said.

"On Tuesday nights, we serve a full dinner in the park and share the Gospel with up to 15 men and women who are homeless. And on Sunday mornings we pick them up and bring them to church. We want to build a relationship with these people and help get them off the stre

"I'm doing great. my own place, a bar account, a very goo and a driver's licens three raises within t months," he said.
